# Introduction

The regional plan is based on the population needs assessment, which included extensive consultation and engagement. An Equality Impact Assessment was undertaken to identify potential inequalities arising from the development and delivery of regional plan. The information gained through this process has been used to develop the North Wales regional plan.

In addition, we also carried out a consultation on a draft version of the regional plan. This report summarises the responses.

## **Consultation and engagement review**

The survey was open for 3 weeks during March, closing on 24 March 2023. There were 48 people who participated in the consultation.

Of the 48 people who gave their survey responses 31 of them chose to answer the equalities questions. Of 31 participants who chose to answer the equalities questions 72% were female and 28% were male.




Figure 1: Sex of survey participants.

There was a good diversity of adult age groups that answered the survey, providing a broad range of experience and opinion. There were no replies from children and young people, but there is an ongoing programme of engagement and co-production as part of the RPB children's workstream to make sure the voices of children and young people are at the heart of what they do.




Figure 2: Age distribution of survey participants.

Of the 31 participants that chose to answer the equalities questions:

- all of them identified as White, with 65% identifying as being Welsh in nationality, 29% as English and 19% identifying as British.
- 19% had a disability
- 36% had unpaid caring responsibilities

Overall, the participants were not fully representative of people living in North Wales and those using health and care services, which is why this survey is only part of a broader programme to engage people in the work of the Regional Partnership Board.

# **Consultation findings**

Overall, 92% of participants agreed with the chosen priorities, with only 4 people disagreeing.

For those that said no, the additional priorities included:

- Substance misuse young persons and adults
- Early years
- Cancer, diabetes and other chronic long-term conditions
- Public health prevention of diseases
- Homeless people

There was also a comment that said, "Older people's services are in melt down".

For those that said yes, additional comments on the priorities included further support for them and the following points to consider.

- Learning disabilities and people with neurodevelopmental conditions should be considered as separate priorities, rather than being combined.
- Concern that although children with learning disabilities are mentioned: in practice they are overshadowed by a focus on adults with learning disabilities, often confused with neurodevelopmental services and tend to be excluded from mental health and wellbeing fora.
- Services need to be seamless to ensure that the client is at the centre of all care and assessment.
- 'Older people' should not include those who are fit and active, the priority should be for those identified as needing care as a result of frailty.
- After Covid we have found there are many more issues to deal with and children and young people very often have complex needs.
- The challenge will be in the implementation of the priorities and how we will work with people in these areas.
- There should be equal priority between these priorities.
- We need to talk more about mental health and substance misuse.
- Supporting carers of all ages requires a range of different solutions. Parent carers don't always identify themselves as being a carer.
- Partnerships with stakeholders like community groups, libraries, schools and charities will continue to be important. 'Audits' so services can be targeted appropriately.

There is a need to support citizens to get the maximum benefit from their prescribed medication to alleviate symptoms and/or treat a chronic condition. In the past Community Pharmacies have provided blister packs or medicines trays to support patients - this is not a commissioned service and will cease in 2023. Joint Policies have been agreed between Health and Social Care based on NICE and Welsh Government advice around the administration of medicines by carers. These are low risk medicines are those taken every day by people receiving a prescription from their doctor not complex medication requiring health input.
